Proposed 2023-24 School District Budget Carries 0% Tax Levy Increase

On Tuesday, May 16, Hudson Falls Central School District residents will vote on a \$53,452,809 proposed budget for the 2023-24 school year. The proposed budget, which has an increase of \$4,178,007 or 8.48% over the current year's budget, will result in no increase to the tax levy.

Therefore, the tax levy increase falls well below the New York State property tax cap of 4.15% for the District.

Voters will also elect two members to the Board of Education and vote on a \$450,000 proposition to purchase three school buses and three passenger vans. The state will pay for approximately 90% of the cost of the vehicle purchases, and there would be no tax increase

associated with the bus and passenger van purchases. Residents will also be asked to approve the proposition to further fund the capital reserve account with an additional \$150,000 for future capital projects.

Additionally, voters will be asked to vote on an Energy Performance Contract (EPC), which allows schools to make energy-efficient improvements without the need for increased taxes. The \$3.1 million debt-neutral proposition on the May 16 budget vote, will use New York State building aid, energy savings from the project, and provide roughly \$92,000 in revenue for the district per year moving forward.

The \$53 million dollar budget includes hiring an additional School Resource Officer (SRO) and a \$100,000 capital outlay project to put in additional safety measures. The District will receive state aid reimbursement on this project.

The proposed budget focuses on several key academic areas and puts additional program supports into place. The key academic areas include: increased electives at the high school and middle school; increased graduation credit opportunities at the middle school; and continued focus on reading at the middle school. Additional program supports include: adding a music teacher to provide additional arts opportunities; adding "sensory stations" in the primary school; adding a physical therapist; and focusing on learning to read and reading intervention with our youngest students.

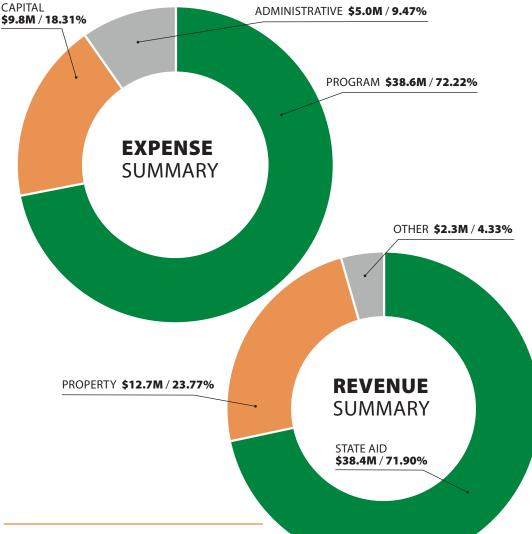

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2023-24 by the qualified voters of the Hudson Falls Central School District, Washington County, New York, will be held at the High School in said district on Tuesday, May 16, 2023 between the hours of 12:00 pm and 8:00 pm, prevailing time, at which time the polls will be opened to vote by voting ballot or machine.

VOTER INFORMATION

Voter eligibility

To be eligible to vote, residents must live in the school district for at least 30 days prior to the May 16 election, be at least 18 years of age and be a citizen of the United States.

Voter registration

Residents may register to vote prior to voting on May 16 in the High School gymnasium with photo identification and proof of residency.

Voting location

The school budget vote will take place from 12 to 8 p.m. on Tuesday, May 16, in the gym of Hudson Falls High School.

Absentee ballot information

- Residents who will not be in the area on May 16 or are otherwise unable to vote in person may request an absentee ballot at the District Office.
- If the absentee ballot is to be mailed to the voter, the application must be submitted at least seven days prior to the vote – by May 9.
- If the absentee ballot is to be picked up by the voter in person, applications will be accepted until May 16.
- Absentee ballots must be returned to the District Clerk no later than 5 p.m. on May 16.

Questions & Answers

Q: How would the proposed budget affect my taxes? Is it within the cap?

The District is presenting its voters with a 0% tax levy change in the proposed 2023-24 budget. The New York State eight-step property tax levy limit formula for Hudson Falls allows for a maximum tax levy increase or "cap" of 4.15% in 2023-24. The 0% tax levy change in the Board of Education's proposed budget plan will not only respond to the community's needs at this time, but preserve and enhance student programming.

Q: What is included in the proposed budget?

The proposed budget maintains all programming, and in many cases enhances programs for our students.

Q: What is an Energy Performance Contract?

An Energy Performance Contract (EPC) allows schools to make energyefficient improvements without the need for increased taxes. The \$3.1 million debt neutral proposition on the May 16 budget vote, will use New York State building aid and energy savings for the project, and provide positive revenue for the district, amounting to roughly \$92,000 per year.

2023-24 BUDGET RESOLVED, the Board of Education of the Hudson Falls Central School District is authorized to expend the sums set forth in the budget in the total amount of \$53,452,809 million during the school year 2023-24 and to levy the necessary tax therefore.	PURCHASE OF SCHOOL BUSES RESOLVED , that the Board of Education of the Hudson Falls Central School District is hereby authorized to purchase two 66-passenger school buses, one 28-passenger school bus, and three 8-passenger Vans at a total cost not to exceed \$450,000 and that the sum of \$450,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary shall be raised by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of said School District and collected in annual installments as provided by the Education Law and the Local Finance Law, and in anticipation of such tax, obligations of said School District shall be issued.

ENERGY PERFORMANCE CONTRACT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Hudson Falls Central School District is hereby authorized to include a \$3,153,668 million- dollar debt neutral proposition for the Hudson Falls CSD to receive up to an additional 10% building aid on an energy performance contract (EPC) to improve energy efficiencies in all buildings. The local share of the EPC is offset in energy saving costs and would have no additional tax impact to residents.	FUNDING OF THE CAPITAL RESERVE ACCOUNT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education, having established a Capital Reserve Fund in the ultimate amount of \$250,000 for the purpose of funding capital projects of the School District and having funded said reserve by transferring into the Capital Reserve Fund the sum of \$100,000 from the School District's 2022-2023 unappropriated fund balance, shall further fund said reserve by transferring into the Capital Reserve Fund an additional \$150,000 from the School District's current unappropriated fund balance. The probable term of the reserve is ten (10) years having commenced on July 1, 2022 and ending on June 30, 2032. Any expenditures from the Capital Reserve Fund shall only occur by authorization of the voters and for the specific purpose for which the Capital Reserve Fund was established. YES NO
